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Introduction

Vital Signs MK is an annual report published by Milton Keynes Community Foundation. The report pulls on published data - both local and national - coupled with insights from the local voluntary sector. The aim of both the quantitative and qualitative data is to illustrate the real lived experience of the citizens of Milton Keynes.

In 2025, Milton Keynes Community Foundation commissioned an independent survey with residents of Milton Keynes in order to better understand the views of residents. The survey interviewed 255 people from Milton Keynes. It was run by Opinium, an award-winning insight agency who specialise in public opinion polling.

The survey was completed by a broad range of people from Milton Keynes and included:

- 154 women, 99 men and 2 non-binary people.
- 94 people aged 18-34 years, 105 people aged 35-54 years and 56 people 55 years and over
- 130 people with children under 18 in their household
- 69 people with an ethnic minority background¹

Full details of the methodology are provided in the appendix.

Summary of findings

- **Milton Keynes residents report a high level of satisfaction with the city overall (81%),** with middle-aged residents (35–54) being the most satisfied (88%), as well as newer residents who've lived in the area for 10 years or less (89%).
- **Two thirds of respondents say they are proud to live in Milton Keynes** and just fewer than a third plan to move away in the next 5–10 years.
- While **there are some concerns - particularly around housing developments and crime,** with respondents feeling that housing choices (44%) and levels of crime (45%) are getting worse - these sit alongside a strong sense of pride and attachment to the area.
- **Respondents also see positive progress in other areas of the natural environment, arts and heritage and community cohesion** - with respondents feeling that the natural environment (43%), access to arts and heritage (42%) and people from different backgrounds getting on well (41%) are all improving.

¹ The ethnicities of the people who took part in the survey were Black, African, Caribbean, Black British (38), Asian, Asian British (30), and another ethnic minority background (3). Due to the small sample sizes an aggregate group (that combined responses from all who identified as an ethnic minority background) was used for reviewing differences in survey responses. We are aware of the limitations of this approach and recognise that there will be differences between the smaller harmonised ethnicity groups that could not be explored in this survey.

Detailed findings

Life in Milton Keynes

There is a high level of satisfaction with Milton Keynes as a place to live

Milton Keynes residents report a high level of satisfaction with the city as a place to live, with 81% feeling satisfied and only 11% feeling dissatisfied with Milton Keynes as a place to live.

Those who feel most satisfied are aged 35-54 years (88% satisfied) and people who've lived in the city for 10 years or less (89%).

Two thirds of people feel proud to live in Milton Keynes

A majority also feel proud to live in Milton Keynes with two thirds of people agreeing that they feel proud to live in Milton Keynes and only 13% disagreeing.


Those who feel most proud are people with children under 18 in their household (72% feel proud).

About half of people feel life is getting better over time in Milton Keynes


52% of people who live in Milton Keynes agree that it is getting better over time, 30% neither agree or disagree and only 18% disagree that it's getting better.

Those who most feel that life is getting better over time are those who've lived there 10 years or less (62% agree life is getting better over time) compared to those who've lived in the city for 21 years or more (44% agree life is getting better over time).


How satisfied or dissatisfied are you with Milton Keynes as a place to live?

Most people are not intending to move away from Milton Keynes

Just under half of Milton Keynes residents (48%) are not intending to move away from the city in the next 5-10 years. A third (32%) of people are intending to move away from the city.

The 12 vital sign areas

12 vital signs: overview

Views on what's getting better and worse in Milton Keynes

We asked people about their impressions of whether things were getting better or worse in Milton Keynes over the last 2-3 years across the 11 vital sign areas.

The top areas that people believed things were getting better for were:

- The natural environment (43% getting better)
- Access to arts and heritage locally (42%)
- A place where people from different backgrounds get on well (41%)
- Transport options (40%)

The top areas that people felt were getting worse were

- Levels of crime (45% getting worse)
- Housing choices (44%)
- Poverty and disadvantage (39%)

Where people most want to see improvements

The areas people most wanted to see improved in Milton Keynes were: levels of crime with 54% of people choosing it as one of their top three areas for improvements, housing choices (to rent or buy) chosen by 45% of people and transport options - chosen by 42% of people.

Secondary priorities included the local economy (35%) and poverty and disadvantage (31%).

Strong Communities & Diversity

A place where people get on well

Most people believe that Milton Keynes community cohesion is getting better over time. 41% of people believe that over the last 2-3 years Milton Keynes has got better as “a place where people from different backgrounds get on well”. Only 16% believe that this has got worse over the last 2-3 years.

The people who believe most in this community cohesion improvement are the following:

- Younger people - 50% of 18-34 year olds think it's getting better compared to 23% of those over 55 years.
- People with someone under 18 in their household - 52% believe it's getting better compared to 30% of those living in households without anyone under 18.
- People who are working - 46% believe it's getting better compared to 26% amongst those who are not working
- People who've lived in Milton Keynes for 10 years or less - 54% feel it is getting better compared to 32% of people who've lived in the city for 21 years or more.
- People with an ethnic minority background are also most likely to believe it's getting better (65%) compared to people who are white (31%)

Sense of community and belonging

The picture of views on the sense of community and belonging is more mixed with only just over a third of the population (35%) feeling that the sense of community and belonging is getting better in Milton Keynes and just over one in five people (22%) feel it's getting worse.

The people who are most likely to believe in the sense of community and belonging getting better are:

- People who've lived in Milton Keynes for 10 years or less - 52% feel it's getting better compared to 24% of people who've lived in Milton Keynes for 21 years or more.
- People who've got children under 18 in the house - 47% feel it's getting better - compared to people without children where only 23% feel it's getting better
- People with an ethnic minority background are also most likely to believe sense of community and belonging are getting better (59%) compared to people who are white (26%)

Work and Local Economy

There are mixed views on whether the local economy (e.g. secure, better-paying jobs) is getting better or worse. While just over a third of people (36%) feel the local economy has gotten better over the last 2-3 years, a quarter of people (26%) feel it has gotten worse. A further 35% feel it is staying the same.

The people who are most likely to feel that the economy has been getting better are:

- Those who have lived in Milton Keynes 10 years or less - half (48%) feel it's gotten better, compared to only 26% of those who've lived there 21 years or more feeling the same
- People with children under 18 years - half (48%) feel it's getting better compared to 22% of those with no-one under 18 in the house feeling the same
- Ethnic minorities - half (48%) agree that the local economy has been getting better over the last 2-3 years

There is a strong belief in people's ability to get a good job in Milton Keynes. Three quarters (76%) who work in Milton Keynes also believe that they have the right skills to get a good job in Milton Keynes and less than 3% believe that they do not.

For those who work in Milton Keynes² there is a high level of enjoyment in their work - two thirds (66%) enjoy the type of job they do all or most of the time. And only one in 20 (6%) feel they hardly ever or never enjoy their work.

However, while people have high levels of confidence in their skills for good jobs and most people enjoy their work, there are higher levels of dissatisfaction with pay. While just over half (55%) of people believe their job has good pay, one in five (20%) do not believe their job has good pay.

Arts & Heritage

On the whole, people believe that access to arts and heritage locally is getting better in Milton Keynes, with 42% feeling it's getting better, 41% feeling it's staying the same and only 12% of people feeling access to arts and heritage locally is getting worse.

There are very few demographic differences in terms of views on this improvement with only people with an ethnic minority background (54%) and people with children under 18 (49%) reporting somewhat higher levels of feeling that things are getting better for arts and heritage than the norm..

Poverty & Disadvantage

People believe that poverty and disadvantage is getting worse in Milton Keynes. Four in 10 people (39%) feel that poverty and disadvantage is getting worse in Milton Keynes over the last

2-3 years. Only one in five people (20%) in Milton Keynes feel that poverty and disadvantage in Milton Keynes is getting better over the last 2-3 years.

Belief in whether things are getting better or worse differs by Milton Keynes residency time:

Education

Four in 10 people (38%) feel that schools, universities and training schemes are getting better in Milton Keynes over the last 2-3 years. Only one in six people (16%) feel that schools, universities and training schemes are getting worse in Milton Keynes.

People with an ethnic minority background are more likely to say that they feel schools, universities and training schemes are getting better with just over half (54%) reporting they feel it's getting better.

People who are not working are less likely to believe education, universities and training schemes are getting better with only 25% of those who are not working feeling it's getting better.

People without children under 18 in their household are also less likely to believe schools, universities and training schemes are getting better with only 26% of those saying it's getting better. However they are no more likely to feel it is getting worse and half (52%) feel it is just staying the same.

Environment

Just over four in 10 people (43%) feel that the natural environment in Milton Keynes has been getting better over the last 2-3 years and just under two in 10 (18%) feel that it is getting worse.

The groups who are particularly likely to think the natural environment is getting better are:

- People who've lived in Milton Keynes for 10 years or less (56% feel it is getting better)
- People with children in the household under 18 (53% believe it is getting better)
- Ethnic minorities (61% feel it is getting better)

There are high levels of access to nature with 85% of people from Milton Keynes agreeing they have access to nature and only 6% disagreeing they have access. Three quarters of people (75%) also believe that they have access to nature's wellbeing effects. One in 10 (9%) do not believe they have access to nature's wellbeing effects though.

Young people are least likely to believe they have access to nature with only three quarters (74%) of 18-34 year olds agreeing they have access to nature and two thirds (66%) agreeing they have access to its wellbeing effects, compared to 95% of people over 55 years of age having access in general and 84% to its wellbeing effects.

Around two in three people (63%) believe that Milton Keynes is on the right track when it comes to the environment and sustainability, one in four (24%) neither agree or disagree that is on the right track and one in 10 (10%) do not believe that Milton Keynes is on the right track when it comes to the environment and sustainability.

Housing

Housing choices

Views around housing are quite divided in Milton Keynes compared to other vital signs but on balance more people feel housing is getting worse than getting better.

Housing choices is an area that people most want to see improvements in with nearly half (45%) of people selecting it as a top priority for improvements in the city. This is a particular priority for people living in the most deprived areas where 64% of people select it as a priority (IMD quintiles 1 &2)

Just over four in 10 people (44%) feel that housing choices (to rent or buy) in Milton Keynes have been getting worse over the last 2-3 years but around a third (32%) feel that housing choices are getting better.

People over 55 and people without children under 18 are less likely to feel it's getting better with only 18% of people aged 55+ and 23% of people without children under 18 feeling it's getting better. 52% of people over 55 feel that housing choices are getting worse.

Ethnic minorities are more likely to also feel that housing choices are getting better (52%).

Again we see that people who have lived in Milton Keynes for less than 10 years are more likely to see things as improving compared to people who've lived in the city longer

Housing developments

Over half of Milton Keynes residents are also concerned about housing developments in the city with 55% of people expressing concern. This concern is shared across all groups with no demographic differences in responses. One in four (27%) are not concerned about housing developments.

Crime and Safety

Levels of crime is the area that people most want to see improvements in with 54% of people selecting it as a top priority for improvements in the city.

Nearly half of people (45%) are concerned about levels of crime getting worse in the city over the last 2-3 years and only one in five (22%) feel that levels of crime have been getting better.

Women are significantly more concerned about worsening levels of crime with half (52%) feeling that levels of crime are getting worse compared to one third (34%) of men.

People who've lived in the city longer are also more likely to feel that crime is getting worse with nearly six in 10 (58%) feeling it's been getting worse over the last 2-3 years.

Health and Wellbeing

Views of the community's health and wellbeing in Milton Keynes are mixed. The largest group of people - four in 10 (40%) - feel that the community's health and wellbeing is staying the same. Three in 10 (31%) feel it's getting better and a quarter of people (24%) feel it's getting worse.

People who are more likely to see the community health and wellbeing as improving are ethnic minorities (51% believe it's getting better) people who've lived in the city for 10 years or less (49% believe it's getting better), and people with under 18 year olds in their home (44% believe it's getting better).

Transport

The main modes of transport used by people in Milton Keynes are private cars (63%), walking (50%), public transport (44%), taxi (17%), cycling (13%), car share / hire care (8%) and motorbike/moped (3%).

Residents of Milton Keynes views on transport options are mixed with 4 in 10 people (40%) feeling that transport options are getting better and three in 10 (32%) feeling that transport options are getting worse.

There were some demographic differences in people's thoughts on public transport

- People living in postcodes that are IMD quintile 1 & 2 - the most deprived areas for the city - are more likely to see transport options getting better (56%) compared to people in IMD quintiles 4 & 5 (only 31% of people in these post code areas feel transport is getting better).
- People with children under 18 in the household are also more likely to believe that things are getting better (52%) compared to people without children in their household (only 28% believe transport is getting better and 39% feel it is getting worse).
- People with an ethnic minority background are most likely to believe transport is getting better with nearly 6 in 10 (58%) believing it's getting better and just 20% of people with an ethnic minority background feeling transport is getting worse.

Transport is a top priority area that people most want to see improvements in. Four in ten people (42%) selected transport as a top priority for improvements in the city. It is a particular priority for residents over 55 years old (55% of whom selected it as a top priority).

The transport options people would most like to see in the next 5-10 years are: Better public transport services (61%), more affordable public transport links locally and within the region (56%), Improvements to the Redway network's safety (47%), more environmentally friendly transport options (34%) and more electric vehicles and charging points (30%).

People over 55 years of age are most likely to prioritise better (79%) and more affordable (68%) public transport links.

The survey was run by Opinium between 4th September and 19th October 2025. A unique link to the survey was also shared by the Milton Keynes Community Foundation during the same period. 249 responses came from Opinium's panel outreach and 6 from Milton Keynes Community Foundation's outreach.
